

The Significance of Ashes

A Reflection by Pope St. John Paul II

The ashes imposed on our foreheads on Ash Wednesday are a reminder of our unworthiness and sinfulness – – sinfulness that corrupts and stains us and leads to death (we return to the dust from whence we came). Ashes remind us of our original sin and our need of redemption – – of our need to be cleansed of sin and made worthy of Salvation. This is why the priest says, as he imposes ashes on our foreheads, "Remember, O Man, that you are dust and unto dust you shall return".

ASH WEDNESDAY AND GOOD FRIDAY ARE DAYS FOR FAST <u>AND</u> ABSTINENCE. FRIDAYS OF LENT ARE ALSO DAYS OF ABSTINENCE.

FASTING is to be observed by all, <u>18 years of age and older</u>, who have not yet celebrated their <u>59th birthday</u>.

On a fast day, one full meal is allowed. Two other meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids, including milk and juices, are allowed. [As are medications, including those prescribed as to "take with food." Any doctor nutritional/dietary approved regimens are thus outside the Lenten disciplines. Holy Mother Church does not envision risking one's health as appropriate for Lent or at any other time.]

ABSTINENCE is observed by all <u>14 years of age and older</u>. On days of abstinence no meat is allowed. It has already been noted that when health or ability to work would be seriously affected, the law does not oblige. When in doubt concerning fast and abstinence, the parish priest should be consulted. (Code of Canon Law, 1251-1252)

Fasting, almsgiving, and prayer are the three traditional disciplines of Lent. The faithful and catechumens should undertake these practices seriously in a spirit of penance and of preparation for baptism or of renewal of baptismal promises at Easter.







What is Synodality?

T hroughout this process, we hear the words: Synod, Synodality, and Synodal process. What do these words mean? Do they mean the same thing?

A helpful short definition of the Synod of Bishops is a gathering of bishops that

- 1. Fosters closer unity between the bishops and Pope
- 2. Provides counsel to the Pope on matters of faith and morals, and discipline of the Church
- 3. Studies questions concerning the Church in the world (c.f. Code of Canon Law c. 342).

Voting in the Synod of Bishops is limited to bishops present at the Synod gathering. However, clergy, men and women religious, theologians, catechists, canon lawyers, and lay experts all participate in the Synod gathering with bishops by providing their counsel.

Synodality and the Synodal process are not a gathering or meeting of bishops, nor are they the administrative arm of the Church. Rather, Synodality is the path and process of the Church as communion. It is the communion of all the baptized who are listening to each other, dialoguing with each other and praying together to hear the voice of the Holy Spirit as we all seek holiness and proclaim the Gospel. Synodality involves clergy, religious and laity listening and speaking, praying and discerning together, and placing the hopes and concerns of the People of God at the foot of the bishops, who, united with the Pope, decide matters of faith and morals in order to preserve the faith and strengthen the Church throughout the world.

"Synodality, in this perspective, is much more than the celebration of ecclesial meetings and Bishops' assemblies, or a matter of simple internal administration within the Church; it is 'the specific modus vivendi et operandi [way of living and being] of the Church, the People of God, which reveals and gives substance to her being as communion when all her members journey together, gather in assembly and take an active part in her evangelizing mission'" (Preparatory Document no. 10). "In fact, this People, gathered together by its

Pastors, adheres to the sacred deposit of the Word of God entrusted to the Church, perseveres constantly in the teaching of the Apostles, in fraternal communion, in the breaking of bread, and in prayer, 'so that holding to, practicing, and professing the heritage of the faith, it becomes on the part of the Bishops and Faithful a single common effort'" (Preparatory Document no. 13). Synodality and the Synodal process are not about engaging others for the purpose of deciding matters through a parliamentary vote. Nor is the primary purpose of Synodality to introduce democratic methods into the Church, where the majority determines how the Church will act. Synodality is also not about promulgating strategic plans or managing pastoral parish ministries through objectives. Synodality is about the entire People of God journeying together to proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ and to become holy.

"The Pastors, established by God as 'authentic guardians, interpreters and witnesses of the faith of the whole Church,' should not be afraid to listen to the Flock entrusted to them. The consultation of the People of God does not imply the assumption within the Church of the dynamics of democracy based on the principle of majority, because there is, at the basis of participation in every Synodal process, a shared passion for the common mission of evangelization and not the representation of conflicting interests. In other words, this is an ecclesial process that can only take place 'at the heart of a hierarchically structured community.' Every Synodal process, in which the Bishops are called to discern what the Spirit is saying to the Church, not by themselves but by listening to the People of God, who 'shares also in Christ's prophetic office' (LG, no. 12), is an evident form of that "journeying together" which makes the Church grow" (Preparatory Document, no. 14 see also c.f. Lumen Gentium no. 12; CCC nos. 91-93).

As we embark on this Synodal process as the local Church of Washington, let us remember the words of Saint Paul to the Thessalonians, "Do not quench the Spirit. Do not despise prophetic utterances. Test everything; retain what is good" (1 Thess. 5:19-21).

The Ten Key Themes of Synodality- for Consultation Discussions

This Synod poses the following Fundamental Question:

A synodal Church, in announcing the Gospel, "journeys together."

The Central Question:

- How is this "journeying together" happening today in your parish and in our diocese?
- What steps does the Spirit invite us to take in order to grow in our "journeying together"?

1. COMPANIONS ON THE JOURNEY:

In the Church and in society we are side by side on the same road.

2. LISTENING:

Listening is the first step, but it requires an open mind and heart, without prejudice.

3. SPEAKING OUT:

All are invited to speak with courage and parrhesia, that is, in freedom, truth, and charity.

4. CELEBRATION:

"Walking together" is only possible if it is based on communal listening to the Word and the celebration of the Eucharist.

5. SHARING RESPONSIBILITY FOR OUR COMMON MISSION:

Synodality is at the service of the mission of the Church, in which all members are called to participate.

6. DIALOGUE IN CHURCH AND SOCIETY:

Dialogue requires perseverance and patience, but it also enables mutual understanding.

7. ECUMENISM:

The dialogue between Christians of different confessions, united by one baptism, has a special place in the synodal journey.

8. AUTHORITY AND PARTICIPATION:

A synodal church is a participatory and co-responsible Church.

9. DISCERNING AND DECIDING:

In a synodal style we make decisions through discernment of what the Holy Spirit is saying through our whole community.

10. FORMING OURSELVES IN SYNODALITY:

Synodality entails receptivity to change, formation, and on-going learning.

Pope announces 2 March as day of prayer and fasting for Ukraine

Pope Francis says his heart aches over the situation in Ukraine and announces a "Day of Fasting for Peace" on Ash Wednesday.

During the General Audience on Wednesday, Pope Francis made a heartfelt appeal for peace in Ukraine, saying that the threat of war had caused "great pain in my heart."

"Despite the diplomatic efforts of the last few weeks," the Pope said, "increasingly alarming scenarios are opening up," with many people all over the world feeling anguish and pain.

""Once again the peace of all is threatened by partisan interests," he stressed. Pope Francis appealed to those "with political responsibility to examine their consciences seriously before God, who is the God of peace and not of war, who is the Father of all, not just of some, who wants us to be brothers and not enemies.""

He also prayed that "all the parties involved refrain from any action that would cause even more suffering to the people, destabilizing coexistence between nations and bringing international law into disrepute."

Prayer and fasting for peace

Speaking at the end of the General Audience, Pope Francis invited everyone to make 2 March, Ash Wednesday, a Day of Fasting for Peace.

"I encourage believers in a special way to dedicate themselves intensely to prayer and fasting on that day. May the Queen of Peace preserve the world from the madness of war," he said.

Russia and sanctions

As the threat of war looms in Eastern Europe, the United States sought to put pressure on Russia on Wednesday by stepping up sanctions.

The U.S., the European Union, Britain, Australia, Canada, and Japan planned to target banks and elites while Germany froze a major gas pipeline project from Russia.

British Foreign Secretary Liz Truss said Britain would stop Russia from selling sovereign debt in London.

The moves come after Russia deployed troops in separatist regions of eastern Ukraine.

Putin on Monday recognized the enclaves in the Donbas region which border Russia, raising increasing fears in the West of a major war.

Ukraine prepares

According to the Ukrainian military, one soldier was killed and six wounded in increased shelling by pro-Russian separatists using heavy artillery over the previous 24 hours.

The military also said Ukraine has started conscripting reservists aged 18-60 following a decree by President Volodymyr Zelenskiy.

Meeting on hold

As the current situation intensifies, the White House said a possible meeting between U.S. President Joe Biden and President Putin is "certainly" not an option at the moment, adding that a de-escalation of conflict with Ukraine would be needed for such a summit.



Ukraine major archbishop responds to Russian invasion: 'The LORD is with us'

God is always on the side of the victims of unjust aggression, the leader of the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church said on Thursday, hours after Russian forces invaded Ukraine.

Major Archbishop Sviatoslav Shevchuk supported Ukraine's right to defend its independence as Russia attacked Ukrainian military targets on the morning of Feb. 24.

"It is our natural right and sacred duty to defend our land and our people, our state and all that is dearest to us: family, language and culture, history and the spiritual world," he said.

The Ukrainian archbishop also emphasized God's closeness to those who suffer injustice.

"We believe that in this historic moment the Lord is with us," Shevchuk said. "He, who holds in his hands the fate of the whole world and of each person in particular, is always on the side of the victims of unjust aggression, the suffering and the enslaved."

"It is He who proclaims His Holy Name in the history of every nation, captures and overthrows the mighty of this world with their pride, the conquerors with the illusion of their omnipotence, the proud and insolent with their self-confidence. It is He who grants victory over evil and death. The victory of Ukraine will be the victory of God's power over the meanness and arrogance of man! So it was, is and will be!" the archbishop declared.

Russian President Vladimir Putin said in a TV statement early Thursday morning that Russia did not have plans to occupy Ukraine, and demanded that the Ukrainian military lay down its arms.

Shortly afterward, Russian troops crossed the north, south, and eastern borders into Ukraine from multiple points. Ukrainian officials reported shelling and missile strikes across Ukraine, including at airfields and military headquarters near Ukraine's capital city of Kyiv.

Both military and civilian deaths have been reported.

Shevchuk said Ukraine "is in danger again," and said "the treacherous enemy" has broken the basic norms of international law, "stepped on Ukrainian soil, bringing with him death and destruction."

"At this historic moment, the voice of our conscience calls us all as one to stand up for a free, united and independent Ukrainian State," he continued.

"The history of the last century teaches us that all those who started world wars lost them, and the idolaters of war brought only destruction and decline to their own states and peoples."

Fears that Russia was beginning a full-scale invasion of Ukraine were heightened this week after Russian President Vladimir Putin announced that he would recognize the breakaway Ukrainian regions of Lugansk and Donetsk as independent entities.

The eastern regions, which are run by Russian-backed separatists, include land currently held by the Ukrainian armed forces.

Ukraine is a country of 44 million people bordering Belarus, Russia, Moldova, Romania, Hungary, Slovakia, and Poland.

According to BBC News, on Thursday Russian military crossed into Ukraine not only from points on the Russian border, but also from Belarus, a Russian ally.

Shevchuk leads the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church, the biggest of the 23 Eastern Catholic Churches in full communion with the Holy See.

"This Church," he said, "which has already survived death and resurrection, as the Body of the Risen Christ, over which death has no power, the Lord gave to his people in the baptismal waters of the Dnipro River," he said.

"Since then, the history of our people and its Church, the history of their liberation struggles, the history of the incarnation of God's Word and the manifestation of His Spirit of truth in our culture have intertwined forever," the archbishop continued.

"And in this dramatic moment, our Church, as a mother and teacher will be with its children, will protect them and serve them in the name of God! In God is our hope and our victory will come from Him!"

"Today we solemnly proclaim: 'Our soul and body offer we for our freedom!' With one heart we pray: 'Lord, Great and Almighty, protect our beloved Ukraine!""
