

Several Christian Churches (including Corpus Christi and us here at St. Ignatius Loyola), the Sons of Israel Synagogue, Community United, the Muslim community in Chambersburg and Shippensburg, Habitat for Humanity, and other smaller organizations in the Chambersburg area, have joined together to help refugees coming into our area who are fleeing countries suffering from natural disasters, famine, persecution, and the ravages of war.

For those of us who have not experienced such calamities, especially during the devastating time of COVID, helping refugees relocate in the United States in the Chambersburg vicinity will afford the grace, in Christian charity, to reach out to those who have undergone such trauma.

There are several areas in which people can offer their time and talent – in whatever amount they choose. Coordinators in the areas of <u>housing</u>, <u>housing supplies</u> (such as linen, furniture, housewares, etc.), <u>transportation</u>, <u>education</u>, <u>fund raising</u>, and <u>job application</u>, will compile lists of volunteers who express an interest in each area. (We were informed by Catholic Charities that the most difficult need to fill is in <u>providing rental space</u>.) The first family that this newly organized group is asked to assist is from Syria (a husband, wife and their three sons: ages 6, 8, and 10). They are expected to arrive in Chambersburg later this month. Following vetting from the U.S. Government and Catholic Charities, temporary housing will be provided for the first few weeks until housing that is more permanent becomes available. Eventually, most refugee families set a goal of home ownership. The family will remain in quarantine for 10 days after receiving the necessary medical clearances from the U.S. Government and Catholic Charities.

The aim of the Catholic Charities Relocation Program and the Chambersburg team is to help these families to become independent and self-reliant within 3 months. However, both organizations remain available for information and assistance on a lesser scale for a period of time after settlement. Also, those refugee families who have established themselves then become available as a resource to any incoming families that follow after and provide an essential part of the support-system for that new family.

This developing Chambersburg unit can provide an example and opportunity of how diverse groups can work together with all our neighbors in an effort to reach out to the least of His children.

Catechism of the Catholic Church

OCTOBER 29, 2021 UPDATE

Under the auspices of the U.S. Departments of State and Homeland Security, Catholic Charities Immigration and Refugee Services has agreed to take on the responsibility of relocating a Syrian family of 5 (husband, wife, and 3 boys: 6, 8,10 years old) who are now in the Chambersburg area with temporary housing.

The family has been supplied with food and monies for the immediate future. There is another Syrian family who has lived here a few years now that will act as their mentors; and are looking forward to be of help for translation and other advise to the new family.

A more substantial home is being offered for rent by Mennohaven in Chambersburg and will be available for occupancy within a few weeks. It is now being prepared for the new residents. Catholic Charities will be helping with their initial expenses. However, the family will be responsible for utilities, their own food and other necessities. Both the mother and father have been found positions of employment by the established Syrian family where they will be employed in an elementary school and a warehouse. The necessary legal papers are being filed so that they can begin those jobs in a few weeks.

The Sons of Israel Jewish Synagogue in Chambersburg (part of the Interreligious Relocation Support Committee) has established an account for them at Orrstown Bank under their own non-profit 301C status in order for any donations to qualify as tax deductible. A sub-committee has been formed to oversee the expenditures of this account which can then be used for any future refugee family coming to the area who will need additional assistance.

There are two churches from the Chambersburg team who have been obtaining furniture for the family's new residence.

Those here at St. Ignatius parish who would like to join the Chambersburg Community Team effort or to offer assistance to refugees coming into the area may call for additional information.

The area of HOUSING is always difficult to fill because of demand and cost. Those who might have access to such a residence or would like to investigate possible resources for future families would be a great help indeed.

Other very specific needs include a FINANCIAL ADVISOR who would teach budgeting, saving, etc., and also might help in fund raising, putting out a future newsletter, obtaining legal and/or medical advise.

Other areas that parishioners may become involved with the volunteers from other churches and civic organizations include: Financial donations; Transportation; Assisting family in finding personal needs (clothing, shoes, housing supplies); and Educational assistance in teaching English to the children and parents. The immediate focus is to help this particular family and others who might be sent to the Chambersburg area very soon. But long-term, we hope to continually include and enlarge the number of active community members -- regardless of race, religion, or political interest – who might give of themselves in the various ways that they are able, to aid these families who are strangers in a strange land to become STRANGERS NO LONGER!



Some COVID-19 Vaccine Recipients Can Get Booster Shots

- People 65 years and older, 50–64 years with underlying medical conditions, or 18 years and older who live in long-term care settings should receive a booster shot.
- People 18 years and older should receive a booster shot at least 2 months after receiving their Johnson & Johnson/Janssen COVID-19 vaccine.

IF YOU RECEIVED Pfizer-BioNTech or Moderna

You are eligible for a booster if you are:

- 65 years or older
- Age 18+ who live in long-term care settings
- Age 18+ who have underlying medical conditions
- Age 18+ who work or live in high-risk settings

When to get a booster:

At least 6 months after your second shot

Which booster should you get?

Any of the COVID-19 vaccines authorized in the United States

IF YOU RECEIVED Johnson & Johnson's Janssen

You are eligible for a booster if you are: 18 years or older

When to get a booster: At least 2 months after your shot

Which booster should you get?

Any of the COVID-19 vaccines authorized in the United States

Choosing Your COVID-19 Booster Shot

You may choose which COVID-19 vaccine you receive as a booster shot. Some people may have a preference for the vaccine type that they originally received, and others may prefer to get a different booster. CDC's recommendations now allow for this type of mix and match dosing for booster shots.

Learn how you can find a COVID-19 vaccine near you.

IF YOU RECEIVED Pfizer-BioNTech or Moderna COVID-19 Vaccine

Older adults age 65 years and older

People ages 65 years and older **should** get a booster shot. The risk of severe illness from COVID-19 increases with age and can also increase for adults of any age with underlying medical conditions.

Long-term care setting residents ages 18 years and older

Residents ages 18 years and older of long-term care settings **should** get a booster shot. Because residents in long-term care settings live closely together in group settings and are often older adults with underlying medical conditions, they are at increased risk of infection and severe illness from COVID-19.

People with underlying medical conditions ages 50–64 years

People ages 50–64 years with underlying medical conditions **should** get a booster shot. The risk of severe illness from COVID-19 increases with age and can also increase for adults of any age with underlying medical conditions.

People with underlying medical conditions ages 18-49 years

People ages 18–49 years with underlying medical conditions **may** get a booster shot based on their individual risks and benefits. The risk of severe illness from COVID-19 can increase for adults of any age with underlying medical conditions. This recommendation may change in the future as more data become available.

People who work or live in high-risk settings ages 18-64 years

People ages 18–64 years at increased risk for COVID-19 exposure and transmission because of occupational or institutional setting **may** get a booster shot based on their individual risks and benefits. Adults who work or reside in certain settings (e.g., health care, schools, correctional facilities, homeless shelters) may be at increased risk of being exposed to COVID-19, which could be spreading where they work or reside. That risk can vary across settings and based on how much COVID-19 is spreading in a community. This recommendation may change in the future as more data become available.

Examples of workers who may get COVID-19 booster shots: [1]

- First responders (e.g., healthcare workers, firefighters, police, congregate care staff)
- Education staff (e.g., teachers, support staff, daycare workers)
- Food and agriculture workers
- Manufacturing workers
- Corrections workers
- U.S. Postal Service workers
- Public transit workers
- Grocery store workers

IF YOU RECEIVED J&J/Janssen COVID-19 Vaccine

People ages 18 years and older who received a J&J/Janssen COVID-19 vaccine at least 2 months ago **should** get a booster shot. The J&J/Janssen COVID-19 vaccine has lower vaccine effectiveness over time compared to mRNA COVID-19 vaccines (Pfizer-BioNTech and Moderna).

Your Vaccination Card and Booster Shots

At your first vaccination appointment, you should have received a CDC COVID-19 Vaccination Record Card that tells you what COVID-19 vaccine you received, the date you received it, and where you received it. Bring this vaccination card to your booster shot vaccination appointment.

If you did not receive a CDC COVID-19 Vaccination Record Card at your first appointment, contact the vaccination site where you got your first shot or your state health department to find out how you can get a card.

Frequently Asked Questions

Are booster shots the same formulation a existing vaccine?

Yes. COVID-19 booster shots are the same formulation as the current COVID-19 vaccines. However, in the case of the Moderna COVID-19 vaccine booster shot, it is half the dose of the vaccine people get for their initial series.

If we need a booster shot, are the vaccines working?

Yes. COVID-19 vaccines are working well to prevent severe illness, hospitalization, and death, even against the widely circulating Delta variant. However, public health experts are starting to see reduced protection, especially among certain populations, against mild and moderate disease.

What are the risks to getting a booster shot?

So far, reactions reported <u>pdf icon[707 KB, 24 pages]</u> after getting a booster shot were similar to that of the 2-shot or single-dose initial series. Fever, headache, fatigue and pain at the injection site were the most commonly reported side effects, and overall, most side effects were mild to moderate. However, as with the 2-shot or single-dose initial series, serious side effects are rare, but may occur.

Am I still considered "fully vaccinated" if I don't get a booster shot?

Yes. Everyone is still considered fully vaccinated two weeks after their second dose in a 2-shot series, such as the Pfizer-BioNTech or Moderna vaccines, or two weeks after a single-dose vaccine, such as the J&J/Janssen vaccine.

When can I get a COVID-19 booster shot if I am NOT in one of the recommended groups?

Additional populations may be recommended to receive a booster shot as more data become available. The COVID-19 vaccines approved and authorized in the United States continue to be effective at reducing risk of severe disease, hospitalization, and death. Experts are looking at all available data to understand how well the vaccines are working for different populations. This includes looking at how new variants, like Delta, affect vaccine effectiveness.

Data Supporting Need for a Booster Shot

Studies show after getting vaccinated against COVID-19, protection against the virus and the ability to prevent infection with the Delta variant may decrease over time.

Although COVID-19 vaccination for adults ages 65 years and older remains effective in preventing severe disease, recent data pdf icon[5 MB, 88 pages] suggest vaccination is less effective at preventing infection or milder illness with symptoms over time.

- Emerging evidence also shows that among healthcare and other frontline workers, vaccine effectiveness against COVID-19 infections is also decreasing over time.
- This lower effectiveness is likely due to the combination of decreasing protection as time passes since getting vaccinated, as well as the greater infectiousness of the Delta variant.

Data from small clinical trials show that a Pfizer-BioNTech or Moderna **booster shot increased the immune response** in trial participants who finished their initial series 6 months earlier. A similar clinical trial showed that a J&J/Janssen booster shot also **increased the immune response** in participants who completed their single-dose vaccine at least 2 months earlier. With an increased immune response, people should have improved protection against COVID-19, including the Delta variant.

Sacrament of the Sick
